Course Description

This course covers concepts and tools for the analysis of the behavior of consumers and firms, consumption decisions, market structures, and general equilibrium. Topics include consumer choice, market demand and equilibrium, production choice, behavior of firms in competitive markets and in markets where firms have market power.
